The Battalion continued its assigned mission within its TaOR. Main effort was placed on maintainin, an open HSR (Route 9). Company size sweeps were conducted periodically. Patrolling and nightly ambushes were conducted each 24 hour period.

The enemy was able to mount only two ambushes during August, one of

which was not effective.

The size of this Thor (450 Sq. Km.) in addition to terrain and continued emphasis on the Mid, all contribute to incomplete coverage of the area. Two reinforced rifle companies are maintained in static outpost positions continually, and frequently a third rifle company is OPCON to another battalion, thus precluding mounting out of anything larger than a company (-) sized reaction force.

Numerous recom tosms from 3d Recon Bn, and Force Recon Co. were employed in an effort to maintain surveilance and as a supplemental effort in

this Taon.

SEQUENTIAL LISTING OF SIGNIFICANT EVENTS

1. Combat Missions Assigned.

- and destroy enemy forces in assigned AO; Maintain security of MSR Route 9 in AO; Maintain patrol base at Ca Lu to deny enemy access through Ca Lu; Deny enemy access through Rockpile/Thon Son Lam area; Intensify patrol activities with emphasis on long range patrols to disrupt and interdict enemy movement, enemy resupply activities, and to gain hard intelligence; Be prepared to deploy Battalion (-) and a Command Group anywhere in the Regimental TAOR area within 24 hours notice to exploit hard intelligence gained, attack and destroy enemy forces, materials, and facilities, making maximum use of supporting arms; Increase attention to effect employment of Psychological Warfare operations; And provide security for supporting arms. Reference 3rd Marines Operation Order 1-67 (20 April 67).
- b. From the period 31 July 1967 to 4 August 1967 the Command Group and two reinforced companies secured Route 9 between Ca Lu and Checkpoint 13 at grid coordinates XD 940423. The mission of securing the road was for the purpose of running resupply runs from Dong Ha to Khe Sanh. Reference 3rd Battalion Frag. Order 44-67.
- c. "I" Company conducted a search and destroy mission from 7 thru
 9 August 67 around the Razorback. Negative contact was made with
 the enemy. Reference Battalion Operation Order 6-67.
- d. "L" Company conducted a search and destroy mission west of Route 9 from this position south toward Ca Lu. On 12 august 1967, the first day out, an enemy base camp was located XD 963487. On 13 august 67 during a Med Evac a UH 34 was disabled by a fire in the engine. The 2nd platoon remained in position to provide security for the chopper while the remainder of the company returns d. The chopper was extracted by a CH 53 the following day and the platoon was helilifted back to this position. The operation was terminated early to meet other commitments. Reference 3rd Marine message 1014502. Battalion Operation Order 7-67.
- e. On 13 August 1967 the Battalion was ordered to send one rifle company (rein) to assume defense of the Khe Gia Bridge and assigned

sector of the Camp J. J. Carroll perimeter. Company "I" was assigned the mission from the 13th of August to the 30th of August when they were relived by Company "I". Ref: 3d Mar Frag Order 5-67, mag 1215352, Bn Frag Order 46-67, Bn Frag Order 50-67.

(f) On 28 August 1967 two companies, Company "L" and "M", occupied the prominent terrain features along the western side of Houte #9 for security of the withdraw of 1/9 and 3/26. The operation was uneventful. 1/9 and 3/26 had completed a seven day sweep of the high ground overlooking Route #9 which was the site of an ambush on 21 August. Ref: Bn Frag Order 49-67.

2. Significant Operations Conducted.

From the 31st of July to the 4th of August 1967 the Battalion Command Group and two rifle companies (rein) were deployed along Route ... 9 from Ca La to checkpoint #13. Their mission was to secure Route ... 9 for passage of the resupply convoy from Dong Ha to Khe Sanh. On the 1st of August a petrol from Company "K" made contact with 3 NVA/VC at XD 976444. The remainder of the operation found negative enemy contact.

On 7 August Company "I" departed for a three day operation around the.
Resorback. There was negative enemy contact during the sweep.

On 12 August Company "L" departed for a sweep along the west side of Roste #9. Company "L" found a one day old base camp at XD 963486. During their sweep there was negative enemy contact.

On 21 August the resupply convoy was ambushed going to Ca Ia. Company "L" (-)(Rein) moved out to help. Company "L" got pinned down going to the convoys assistance. Fighting continued most of the afternoon with artillery and air strikes supporting Company "L". Company "B", 1/9 came under OPCON of 3/3 and took up a defensive posture within our perimeter.

4. Casualties Sustained:

b. Significant Events:

- (1) On 7 August 1967 one man from Has Company was struck on the forehead by an outgoing mortar round while firing same. Company "I" suffered one heat casualty on a patrol. Two men from Company "K" were wounded by a friendly 81mm mortar short round.
- (2) Oh 8 August 1967 Company "I" sustained five heat casualties while on an operation.
- (3) During the period 12-16 August 1967, the battalion experienced an epidemic of food poisoning/Bascillary Dysentary: 4 cases on the 12th, 14 on the 13th, 8 on the 14th, 7 on the 15th, and 2 on the 16th. Source believed to be feeal contamination of food with flies as vector and indigenous personnel as source.
- (4) On 13 August 1967 Company "I" evecuated six men from the field (3 FOO's, 1 possible rib fracture, 1 heat casualty and 1 anaphylactic reaction from an insect bite).
- (5) On 21 August 1967 personnel of our command were ambushed between the Battalion CP and Company "M" at Ca La. The following casualties were sustained:

d. Medical trends:

- (1) Compared with the month of July, there were less malaria cases, but an increase in Fever Undetermined Origin. All other conditions with the exception of an outbreak of dysentary remain approximately the same.
 - e. Preventative medicine and canftation.
- (1) Immunizations and skin tests administered this month totaled 2,953.
- (2) Insect and rodent control measures are in action, and moderate control is maintained.
 - f. Problem areas:
 - (1) There are no significant medical problem areas at this time.

g. Dental referrals: 30

- (1) In addition to the above referrals, a dental unit has been in our area, and has served the needs of five companies in the field.

6. Command Relations.

a. OPCON - 3d Marines, ADCON - 3d MarDdv

b. 131230H August, Company "I" chopped to 1/9 to assist in defense of Camp J. J. Carroll and the Khe Gia Bridge.

o. 211550H August, Company "B", 1/9 chopped to this battalion as re-

d. 221105H August, Company "B", 1/9 returned to 1/9. NOTE: 1/9 and 3/26 (-) conducted a two battelion sweep in this TAOR for 4 days. 22-26 Aug. e. 361000H August, Company "I" relieved Company "I" and remained OPCOH 1/9.

7. Equipment.

a. ME-10 - one 100 cubic foot refrigerator was received during August.

8. Logistics.

a. Supply.

(1) Class I

(a) All 3/3 positions presently maintain 10 days on hand supply. For the uppoming monsoon season plans call for an increase to 15 days on hand supply.

(b) Halizone tablets which have been on order for over 30 days

are critical in demand for operational committments.

(c) Bulk purification agents are in stock for all 3/3 units.

(2) 01 see II.

(a) Clothing - Jungle utilities have been in critical demand for 35 days. The major shortage has been in trousers, sizes extra small and smallregulars. Utility covers, all sizes, which have been on order since March, also are critical. (b) Boots - there has been a critical shortage of boots for over 60 days in sizes 7W, 8R, 8W, 9R, 10R, 11R, 11W, 15W and 15R. We have a man who is combat ineffective because the boots that were ordered for him (size 16ee) have not been received and have been on order since June.

(c) First Aid Packs/Jungle Kits - This item and its accounterments have been on order for over 90 days. A critical shortage is seen in small

battle dressings.

(d) Lensatic Compasses are in critical shortege and have been on order for over 90 days. The need of each squad leader and higher leaders for this item has not been filled. 200 compasses have been ordered.

(e) GP Tents - these have been on order (50) for over 90 days.
(f) Fighting Hole Covers - these have been on order (500) for

over 90 days.

(3) Class III. Petrolium

(a) Our gasoline and diesel oil is stocked at our main position. We have on hand 26 gasoline barrels and 15 diesel oil barrels. For the month of august we have had no problems or difficulties in this field.

(4) Class IV. Engineer and Field Fortification Materials

(a) For over 45 days there has been on request a requirement for bunker materials (4x12's, 2x6's and 2x4's) needed to complete our positions before the onset of monsoon season. There has been no problem obtaining other Class IV items such as barbed wire, sandbags etc.

(5) Plass V. Ammunition

Each rifle company in the battalion is up to a level of 10 days ammunition supply. At Battalion Supply we are maintaining:

We have had problems with defective mortar emmunition in both 60mm and 81mm. In 60mm our problems are with Lot #205 1599Ff (11 auds), MA 2-14 (70 duds).

The majority of the above rounds were recieved rusty and wet from ASP.

b. Metor Transport.

Our current situation is judged as critical due to the lack of M-422 (Mighty Mites) and Muls parts and tools to properly service and maintain them.

Normally we use non-organic transportation for our surface resupply runs. The trucks are provided by 9th MT Battalion. Each truck averages 49 miles daily and carries an average of 12 tons of gear per day. Our organic transportation is concerned mainly with short convoy

security and/or courier runs to J.J. Carroll or Dong Ha. Other tasks performed are track, water, and mess hall runs within the three positions.

Our mules average 10 miles per day while our H-422A1's average 37 miles per day.

c. Engineer Assistance.

This month we used a TD 15 Bulldozer on loan from 3d Engineer Battalion to build hunkers, revetments and defensive positions.

Our only problem lies in the fact that due to the operational committments of the engineers we have trouble trying to get the apparatus back to complete the heavy work.

d. Maintenance Problems.

- (1) Automative parts we have had on order for over 90 days, spark plugs (#4 spark), M-422A1 carburetors, generator belts (M-422A1) Fan Belts (M-422A1), Fan Belts (M-274A1), and tires (M-422A1).
 - (2) Refrigerator parts The acquisition of the MS-10 Refrigeration unit did not include any spare parts. Spare parts and maintenance kits are on order.

Two of our 106 RR are not operational because of a shortage of ground momuts. One mount was Code X in May67 and one went to FLSU in May67.

9. Civic Action.

During the period of laug67 through 31 aug67 this commend found it expedient to employ civilian labor from the village of Cam Lo on work details. That included clearing fields of fire, the building of a mess hall and filling samplages to be used in the bulltime of bunkers. These people were employed in the self-help program and have been paid in salad eil and bulgar. Also medical assistance in the form of Medcaps has met only been given to the people of Cam Lo but also to the villages within our TAOR. The most

significant Medcap held this last month was with in our TAOR at the village of new Arong at coordinates 998417. The village was hit by enemy mortant 3 Montgnards were killed an 7 wounded.

Due to the increase of enemy activity near the two villages at coordinates WD 003473 and XD 997478, planning is in the process at this time to relocate the civilians in these two villages in Cam Lo, later we plan

to relocate all villages within our TAOR.

During the last month medical assistance has been rendered to 67 men, 177 women and 584 children within our TAOR, and approximately 250 people a day in Cam Lo. A total of 793 people have been employed, being paid one gallon of salad oil or one sack of bulgar for every two persons per day.

10. Administration.

- (a) An awards ceremony was held during the month of August 1967, and the Commanding Officer. 3d Marine Division (Rein) FMF, presented the following awards to members of 3d Battalion, 3d Marines.
 - 1 Silver Star
 - 6 Bronse Stars
 - 1 Kery Commendation Medal
 - 26 Purple Heart Medals.
- (b) Two Specila Courts-Martial were completed, and one is pending. One Summary Court-Martial was completed, and none are pending. Three Battalion Commander's Office hours were completed, and one is pending. There were six Company Commander's Office Hours completed.
- (c) Special Services supplied a fairly regular amount of beer and soda ration for the battalion. Athletic gear is available, and some stationary and games have been received and distributed. All of these items are definitely contributing to the outstanding morale of the command.
- (d) PX services were made available to five companies in the field through the mobile exchange. A sufficient supply of SP rations were available for the necessary health and comfort items.
 - (e) Liberty was not authorized during this period.
- (f) buring the month of August, 6 officers and 123 enlisted Marines rotated to CONUS. There was 1 officer and 5 enlisted transferred within the regiment or division.

11. Personnel.

- (a) Gains: 2 USAC Off; 89 USAC Enl; 1 USA Off; and 0 USA Enl.
- (b) Losses: 6 USMC Off; 136 USMC Enl; 1 USN Off; and 6 USM Enl.
- (c) Monthly strength (average):

(d) Net loss:

- (e) Emergency leave for the month of August: 1 USN Officer, 2 USAS Enlisted. There were no Hamanitarian Transfers. Twice/trice wounded or reassigned outside of RVE due to father/brother in country, 2 USAS enlisted.
- (f) There was one Hardship Discharge applied for during the past month. However, it was disapproved, but is pending decision on a Humanitarian Transfer.
 - (g) No Administrative Discharges were completed, and none are pending.
- (h) The R&R program continues to be a major morale factor within this command. There were 44 In-Country and 93 Out-of-Country R&R quitos utilized during this reporting period.
 - (i) Morale is considered to be excellent to outstanding.
- (j) Postal service continues to be sporadic, with as much as two days delay between regular mail calls. Mail is considered to be one of the main factors in contributing to the excellent morale of this command. Increased service would contribute further to the morale of the members of this battalion.

12. Intelligence.

The month of August started out with a continuation of contact begun

in July 1967.

On 1 August 1967 a patrol from Company "K" made contact with an estimated 3 NVA setting in an OP overlooking Route 9 at coordinates XD 976444. The contact resulted in 1 KIA confirmed and 1 VIA confirmed by small arms fire. This OP was believed to have been a part of an NVA regiment (+) ambush of Route 19 on the 21 July 1967.

No significant activity was reported until 14 August then a squad (rein) from Company "M" made contact with 40-50 VC at coordinates YD 040445. Con-

test resulted in 4 Enemy KIA (conf) and 10 Enemy KIA (prob). Prior intelligence reports indicated a definate pattern of activity in this area with repeated sightings and contacts by recon units working in that area.

On 19 August a Company "L" patrol observed 1 HVA sitting on the side of a draw at coordinates XD 948516. The point man opened fire, the enemy

fled, the results were 1 Enemy WIA (prob).

On 20 August an FO on the Rockpile spotted 1 NVA/VC next to the road at

Coordinates XD 985505. A fire mission was called, results were negative.

On the 21st of August at 1330H an estimated 500 NVA ambushed a 3/3 convoy at coordinates XD 994434. A plt reactionary force with two twin 40's from the battalion CP was sent out to assist the convoy and came under intense AW, SA, and motar fire from coordinates XD 980513. Both twin 40's took direct hits from RPG-2's and were put out of action. Two more platoons with tanks were dispatched from the Battalion CP, and a platoon from "M" Company with 2 tanks and 2 twin 40's from a patrol mear the ambush site were sent to assist the convoy. The platoon with the two tanks and two twin 40's moved in from the south, linked up with the convoy and then returned to "M" Company position at Ca Lu. Mean while the company (-) that was dispatched from the Battalion CP linked up with the platoon under fire and began to retalliate with air and artillery support with outstanding results.

The enemy used supporting arms in the form of 50 Cal MG's, 57 rocoiless rifle, RPG-2's and an anti-aircraft gun. The ambush site ran from coordinates XD 980523 to XD 982504. One POW was taken and as a result of his interrogation it was reported that he was from the 325B Division, 29th Regtiment, K-8 Battalion. For a detailed interrogation report see

section 4.

On the 22nd of August 1/9 and 3/26 began an operation in this same area. Many fighting holes were found along the ridgeline. The enemy continued to motar 1/9 at will for 3 to 4 days.

On 28 August 1/9 and 3/26 were pulled out of our TAOR.

On 22 August at 2325H Mike Company at Ca Lu recieved two motar rounds both of which impacted outside the permiter.

On the 24th of August C/6-4 observed 7 enemy at coordinates XD 904497. Fire Mission called with good target coverage. From the 25th-30th of August there was negative enemy contact within the Battalion TAOR.

On the 31st of August at 0200H the bridge north of "M" Company position at coordinates YD 008465 recieved an estimated 100 rounds of 82 mm motar. All the rounds landed outside the permiter, but several rounds landed in the village at coordinates YD 992494. Three montagnards were killed and seven wounded. Early the next morning C-2 made a Med-Cap in the village and on the way back the enemy again attempted an ambush on the convoy at coordinates XD 973507 at 1050H. One RPG round, motars, and SAF from 3 to 4 semi-automatic weapons were fired at the convoy.

On 31 August at 1400H C-3 spotted 5 NVA at coordinatesXD 975508. An artillery mission was called with good coverage on target. At 1745H an OP near Battalion CP position heard noises in a tree line at coordinates

XD 963533. A fire mission was called. Results unknown.

At 311940E Conviction "W" spotted 3 to 4 MVA sitting on the side of a hill at coordinates XD 978493. An artillery mission was called.

During the month of August a total of 19 detainees were apprehended within our TAOR. all detainees were forwarded to 15 CIT but none of them were held after interrogation.

Communications.

- a. General. The Communication Platoon was engaged in "Operation Kingfisher" during the month of August. The Communication Platoon provided and maintained the necessary radio nets, wire systems and message center, both forward and rear.
- b. Training. Operational training during this period consisted of on the job training for all sections which included interchanging of operational communications personnel between military occupational specialties. A school was set up for new company operators to instruct them in the use and maintenance of the LN/PRC-25 radio.
- c. Communications Equiptment Status. The status of communication equipment is poor. The percentage of combat essential equipment available is 70%. The following combat essential items are down:

 - 1 AM/TGC-14A Toletype 10 AM/PRC-25 Radios 2 AM/MRC-83 Radio Jeep 1 AM/MRC-87 Radio Jeep
 - LN/TPS-21 Ground Radio Unit
- d. Problem Arons. The biggest problem area continued to be the chronic shortage of _N/PRC-25 accessories, which if not allowiated soon could cause some radios to be deadlined. _nother problem is the lack of replacement radios in the supply system for Code "X" radios. We have had five radios Code "X" since Jume.

The increased amount of wet weather has been causing a number of handsets to go down due to bad transmitter elements. This can be rectified by covering the handset with a plastic battery bag during rainy woather.

- A. Name: Phom Dinh Chinh
- B. D.O.B. 1947

- D. Rank/Unit: PFC, 4th Sqd, 2nd platoon, C-1Co, K-3 Bn, 29th Reg't, 325B

- G. Circumstances of capture: Captive was wounded in ambush against H 3/3 and was subsequently captured.
- 2. Information obtaineds
- A. Captive Mission. Captive is a rifleman.
- B. Unit Missicn. The mission of the K-8 Bn. is to operate in the Khe
- Sanh area and to be ready to move any time.
- C. Composition: The 325B Division is composed of the 25th, 27th and 29th Reg't. The 25th Reg't is composed of the K-1, K-2 and K-3 Bns. The 27th Reg't is composed of the K-4, K-5 and K-6 Bns. The 29th Reg't is composed of the K-7, K-8 and K-9 Bns. The K-8 Bn. is composed of the C-1, C-2 and C-3 and C-4 companies. The C-4 company is a mortar company. There are 5 platoons in the C-4 company and 3 squads in each platoon. There is one recon sgrad attached directly to the headquarters battalion.
- D. Strength: Captive states that when the K-8 Bn. came to SVN it had a strength of 600, but due to sickness and casualties, the strength is down to 400. The company has about 70 men, the 2d platoon C-1 has about 26 men; and the 4th squad, 2d platoon C-1 has 5 men. The recon squad has 7 men. The C-4 company has four 82mm mortars and two agn-43 HeC's. Nach of the infentry platoons has nine RPG's (three per squad) three 3-40's and two RP-46.
- E. Disposition: The K-8 Bn. CP is Located in a thickly wooded desolated area about a two days walk from the ambush site. This interrogator believes the CP area to be at XD 870493. The C-1, C-3 and C-4 companies are also in this area. The companies are dug in. They are in esmouflaged holes for concealment from the air but are not fighting holes. The captive heard that there is a Battalion aid Station about one days walk to the northwest and that the C-2 company is located about one days walk to the northwest of the aid station. All the captive knew about the C-2 was that it's aid was not needed at the present time so they were not located with the rest of the battalion.

Logistics: Captive states that the K-8 Bn. receives its food and aumo and medical supplies from an NVA transportation company which comes twice a a month. The battalion is constantly short of food and same. Food consists of salt, rice and camed pork in a 5" long, 1" wide, 1" can.

Soldiers recieve three cans of pork a nonth.

- G. Communications other than operations company messengers (2 per company) are used, but on operations the Bn's two watt battary powered radios are used. There are 5 in the battalion and eight at the battalion head-quarters section until companies go on operations and they are then dram. H. Medical: Medical supplies are good and the battalion has enough. Seriously wounded or sick are sent to the Battalion Aid Station (see disposition E). Captive states that 4 men from his squad had malaria and went to the Battalion Aid Station. There is 1 medic and 2 stretcher bearers per company. The stretcher bearers can bandage a wound but are not medically trained.
- I. Morale captive states mcrale is average. When asked to explain this he said that many of the men were eager for battle and wanted to liberate SVN but also many were not eager for battle and were afraid of death. J. Miscellaneous: (1) Captive states that he does not know the present location of the K-7 and K-9 battalions, 29th Rag't or the Reg't headquarters but that he heard they were coming to SVN soon. He has heard that the 25th and 27th Regt's were located at Ha Trinh (p) Namdang (d) Nghe An (p) NVN about a months ago. About three months ago, when exceeding a small river they were told they were crossing a tributary of the Ben Hai River and that Ions was 7-8 kilometers to the west. However, captive didn't know their experi location. Captive says as far as he knows, his unit never opened in south of Highway 9 or in Lacs. He also stated that the K-8 Bn. has been in SVN approximately 5 months. Captive states that before the attack on the convoy, they were not sure if a convoy was scheduled run on note. They arrived at night and were supposed to wait one complete day if there was no convoy they were to return to their base camp. The following morning there was a convoy, they were supposed to attack and return to their base camp (Bn CP). Usually the K-8 Bn. stays in one place for a month and moves 1-2 days walk and stays there for another month. Captive says they have been in their present position for a month and are due to move.
- For Personalities: Cuong Sr Capt Company K-8 small thin moustache one upper gold tooth in front usually liked by troops.

 Can 1st Lt XO K-8 Bn. Tall young looking.

 Hanh Sr Capt Po K-8 Bn. Very tall, young looking.

 Vu Bac Thion 1st Lt Company "C". Big build, tall, moustache and beard.

 Thuan 2d Lt XO C-1Co. Short thin, pale complexion.

 Le Thanh Nghi WO 2d platoon leader C-1Co. Short

 Bac Magt Asst platoon leader 2d platoon C-1Co. Tall

 Huyen Sgt 4th sqd leader, 2d platoon C-1Co. Short, dark complexion

- 3. Interrogators comments: Captive appeared to be truthful, of average intelligence, and very co-operative. He quite often asked where he would be sent next (what hospital or POW camp). If he would eventually be turned over to ARVE hands and if he would be allowed to return to NVE someday.
