"ARR ATTVE STAMARY

The Battalion centimued to carry out its assigned mission in accordance with 9th Marines Operation Plan 1-68, for the 1-3 position. During the period of 1-7 January the Battalion devoted a major effort to completing the required fortication of 39 Dye-Marker living bunkers and four radar bunkers. A fire support plan and attendant defensive scheme of maneuver for both a two and three company defense was completed, and standard fighting positions, obstacles, overhead wire, and ammunition bunkers were completed to support both plans. Third Battalion, Fourth Marines occupied Will 28 (YD170730) to the northwest of 1-3 and screened in its 'O north of the trace to the DMZ, until 12 Janusry. With the major Dye-Marker construction effort largely completed, greater emphasis shifted to long range and local security operations. It was therefore determined that the presence of 3/4 on Will #28 was no longer required to ensure the security of the northern approach to A-3. On 12 January 3/4 moved to a new location near Con Dinh and chopped "K" 3/4 to the OPCON of this Bettalion. Wile 3/4 along with Kile 3/3 occuppied defensive positions on Hill 428 while Lima and India Companies defended the 1-2 position. On 14 January Kilo 3/4 was chopped OPCON to the 12th Marines to relieve Mike 3/3 which was returned to the 4-3 position on the same date. Upon the return of Mike Company from the OPCOW of the 12th Merinas Lima Company was moved forward to defend the eastern sector of Hill "28. In addition to preparation and improvement of defensive positions on 1-3 and Hill 428, the battalion committed over two reinforced commanies nor day to security and sweep operations. Tectical operations routinely included a requirement to employ one company (rein) to provide security for the 11th Engineer Battelion personnel constructing MR 4566 between Poute 41 and '-3. This mission was accomplished by sweeping all probable embush sites and north-south evenues of approach in the eastern portions of the 'O, as well as providing close in security for the construction personnel. 'dditionally not loss then one platoon (rain) swept the western sector of the 'O end e minimum of five squad or fireteam sentinal posts were employed for daylight local security. A minimum of four squed size night embushes and three firsterm listening posts were also employed. Extensive use of night observation devices, starlight scopes and PPS reders, substantially contributed to the security and fire direction of orts of the Battelion. This month also saw a marked incress in the exploitation of all supporting fires, in particular direct and general support ertillary and ground controlled air support. Of particular note was the continued profesionalism and expertise of the Aerial Observers assigned to cover the Bettelions 10.

On 13 separate occasions a total of 54 friendly artillery rounds were received in or near the inner permiter of 1-3 and Hill #28. These rounds were fired from C-1, '-2 and C-2 and on certain of these occasions great difficulty was experienced in achieving the coordination required to "check fires". Corrective action appears to have been initiated and a definite improvement in this regard has been made during the latter part

of the month.

From artillery and mortar fires have been received on eight occasions for an overall total of 143 rounds most of which did not strike the permiter. Only four casualties were sustained from enemy incoming artillery and mortars. Ground contact has been generally limited to mueting engagements of limited scope and both friendly and enemy sniper activity. On several occasions the enemy attempted night probes ranging from 4-15 personnel in strength. On each occasion enemy paragenal were engaged by local security at close range. On 30 January Mike Company engaged a column of 25 NVA conducting a night movement from north to south approximately 1,000 meters from the 1-3 position. The NVA were engaged at close range from an ambush position and heavy casualties were inflicted upon the NVA. A large quantity of enemy equipment and documents were recovered.

There have been several changes in command and staff assignments in the past month, the most significant of which was the assumption of command by LtCol J. W. MRSH from LtCol R.C. NEWHYM, on 21 January 1968.

There have been no significant problem areas experienced during the past month. Cosualties have been light, norel is considered excellent to outstanding and support has been substantial.

PART ITI

SEQUENTIAL LISTINGS OF SIGNIFICANT EVENTS

1. Combat Missions Assigned:

- a. Basic Mission. To conduct missions in assigned area of operations in accordance with 3d MarDiv Operation Order 59-57. (Kentucky)
- b. To conduct anti-infiltration operations in AO with special emphasis on interdicting north-south infiltration routes, assume responsibility for enlarged AO, to include outpost of Mill 428 with not less than two rifle companies at night; defend A-3 and provide protection for construction effort on Route 566. Reference: 9th Marines Operation Flan 2-68; 9th. Marines Frag Order Pumber 12 (Opn Ventucky).
- o. On 24 January 1968, Lima and Mike Companies and Command Group (-) mission was to seize Battalion Objective #1 (YD 197716) and #2 (YD 201705) and sweep assigned axis of advance, to destroy all bunkers and tunnels encountered, to apprehend all civilians making an overt attempt to avoid friendly forces. Reforence: Battalion Frag Order 1-68
- d. On 29 January 1968, Lima and India Companies and Command Group Alpha's mission was to secure Battelion Objectives #1 thru #4 and establish OP's on commanding terrain; destroy enemy bunkers and positions encountered; determine possible enemy positions, infiltration routes, OP's and ambush sites; conduct terrain analysis of areas in the vicinity of Objectives #1 and #2 in connection with planning of night platoon ambush operations. Reference: Battalion Frag Order 2-68.

Significant Operations Conducted.

- a. On 24 January, Lima and Mike Companies conducted a sweep of the entire western 40 south of MSR 566. Lima Company moved west of the 4-3 position with the Command Group and subsequently charged direction to the southeast in a diversionary effort. Mike Company moved from 4-3 directly in an easterly direction south of the MSR to Hill #44 and established a company base camp. This phase of the operation was conducted under the cover of darkness with little difficulty. At such time as Mike Company was in position, Lima Company began a datailed search of the southern most section of the 40 with negative results. The companies returned to the perimeter at 4-3 prior to last light without contact.
- b. On 28 January, Tima Company departed its defensive positions on Hill #28 to sweep the northern boundary of the AO and subsequently established a blocking position/patrol base at YD 190745. India Company moved with the Command Group 1,000 meters south of Lima Company and subsequently swept north to the intersection of the railroad tracks and the DMZ at YD 193752. Initial movement was executed without contact. While Lima Company remained in position India Company swept south to YD 187710, at which time both companies returned to their defensive positions prior to last light. Negative contact was gained.

3. Casualties Inflicted on the Enomy.

a. During the month of January, 3d Battalion, 3d Marines, inflicted the following casualties on the enemy; 14 NVA KIA (confirmed); 1 Viet Cong (POW); and 2 Vietnamese detainess which were subsequently released as innocent civilians.

- (1) On 9 Jan Mike Company came under attack by enemy mortars sustaining 3 VIA's and 2 MA's.
- (2) On 11 Jan one member of Lima Company was wounded by friendly extillery during a fire mission.
- (3) On 13 Jan a Corpsman assigned to Kilo Commany fell into a hole and suffered a fractured left tibia.
 - (4) On 14 Jan 4 Marines and 1 Correman were injured when a Marine alledgely threw a grenade among them
- (5) On 15 Jan one member of Lima Company was shot by a sniper while on patrol.
- (6) On 23 Jan 3 members of Mike Company sustained injuries from onemy norters. One member of tenks was also wounded.

a. Supply.

(1) General. During this reporting period the battalion has been building up the A-3 position. A daily resupply by helicopter is the only means of transportation to A-3. This resupply carries all classes of supply plus personnel and equipment.

The battalion has built up its stocks on obsition with a 10 day supply of Class I and V for reserve purposes. This stock is set aside and wired up and can only be used in case of emergency.

The weather was been the only problem of resupplying the battalion and

has had a large effect on being able to resupply the A-3 position.

- (2) Class I A daily resumply keeps the regular supply of Class I maintained at a three to five day level. Water buffalos are hauled out with the resupply by helicopter.

10. Administration.

- a. There were no awards ceremony held during the month of January.
- Martials are pending. Five Battalless Countries Office Hours were completed and none are pending. There were seventeen Company Commander's Office Hours completed and ten are pending.

- h. The R&R program continues to be a major morale factor within this command. There were 28 la-Country and 77 Out-of-Country R&R quotes used during this reporting period.
 - i. Morale is considered to be excellent to outstanding.
 - j. Postal services during the month of January has been excellent.

12. Intellegence.

Enemy activity was at a low key in the 3d Bottalion, 3d Morines 40 during the reporting period. There was evidence of numerous small unit movements in the 40.

Well used trails, stall unit sightings and the interrogation of a Viet Cong POW indicated that local Viet Cong and NVA units are receiving resupply and reinforcements from North Vietnam through the use of harbor sites and base camps in the southern DMZ area.

A Viet Cong POW was captured on 18Jan68 during a sweep by Mike Company. Interrogation of the prisoner determined that he was a local force Viet Cong leader who had been trained in North Vietnam. The POW's mission was to spread propaganda and harass U.S. and ARVN troops with sniper fire. His unit, consisting of 10 to 15 man, conducted it's operations from a base camp located at in Ya, and used this area as an entry point south to the 9th Marines 'O. The prisoner stated that the 27th Interpendent Battalion received resupply across the Ben Hai River every 5-15 days. 20 man were used to carry supplies.

The infiltration routes used are along the railroad tracks parallel to Route 41 and the north-south trail at YD 190745. The time of movement has been in the late afternoon or early evenings, prior to 2300H.

Two contacts were made with enemy elements on or near the north-south trail. The first resulted in 2 WA KIA and 1 POV. The most significant contact was made by a Mike Company ambush on 30 January 68. The ambush site was checked at first light and revealed one WA KIA (corf), blood trails, 2 individual weapons, many packs and large quantities of rice, meat and clean uniforms. Also found were 600 rounds of 7.62 ammunition, ponchos, hammocks, surgical equipment, money, picutres, grandes and a pouch of unopened mail. The quality and amount of equipment found indicates that the enemy element was a resupply unit.

The discipline of the enemy unit under fire and his actions at the time of the authorsh indicate that the enemy were new reinforcements corrying resupply items rather than regular transcribers who would be familiar with the area.

The 2d Battalion, 8054 NVA Regiment had been identified as operating north of the 4-3 position, in the southern DNZ. To date no evidence of a platoon size or larger unit has been found in the 5d Battalion, 3d Marines area of operations.

13. Communications.

during the month of Jahusty in the ferward and rear positions. Battalion, Regimental and Admin nots were maintained. A switchboard was maintained by Lima Company during the period of time that this company was operating outside the behanding perimeter. The wire section completed the task of wiring and overheading a new wire cable throughout the entire perimeter. During the month of January the construction was completed on a new communications bunker in our rest eres. This punker serves to house message center, switchboard, radio 1945, 15 all as all classified documents and equipment.

b. Training. The majority of the platoon's training was of an on-thejob basis. However, during this time, classes were conducted in order to cross-train both redio and T'CP sections. There still remains a constant effort to cross-train wire and radio personnel. New radio personnel are training with the rifle companies. c. Communication Equipment Status. d. Problem Argos. hip and tame antennos remain in whort supply. To now have 10 AN/PRC-25's still to be replaced. This remains to be a handicap for the proper functioning of this plateon. It is noted that the overall life of our BA-386's has taken a share decrease during the month. This is especially true of both the "Burgess" and the "Crown" batteries. Relative to this, is the fact that the "Crown" batteries are not packed in a plastic waterproof bag, and therefore are somewhat exposed to moisture before their initial use.

14. Weather. The general weather for the month of January was mild with shoradic rain, cold and surny, dry days. The rain become sparse toward the end of the month allowing the ground to dry considerably and become hard. However, fog has remained a problem in the early morning hours, remaining thick and wet until mid-morning. The temperature averaged a high of 73.8 degrees and a low of 64.1 degrees. Total rainfell was only 1.36 inches for the month. The wind was generally from the northwest and averaged 6.4 knots. The average humidity was 84.2 per cent and mean visibility was 5.2 miles.

15. Fire Support.

a. General. The majority of missions fired were of cuspected enemy position nature. Very few live missions were fired and these that were, generally took place at night and surveillance was impossible. Artillery was credited with these confirmed kills from either NAC's or prep fires.

b. Problem Areas. The major problem area came from friendly fire imnacting in and around the arimeter. The needlem in some cases was found at the firing bettery but in most cases no answer was found.

The other problem spans included a lack of feed back. The battalian never knew how many of our hats were fired and when they were cancelled or why they were cancelled. For this reason the count on hits is inaccurate.

When training was conducted the companies covered basic military subjects. Other subjects stressed were patrolling, may said compass reading, radio procedure and forward observer proceedings.

There were two special schools held during the worth. A radar school was held for HAS Company and selected perconnel vital the individual companies. Also an aircraft resognition school was held for the S.2 Scouts, personnel on the OP's, and selected personnel in the individual companies.

Object - At 1000H, a patrol from Kilo Company discovered a bunker complex at YD 192720 containing 12 bunkers and numerous fighting holes. Enemy equipment was found on the position and forwarded to Regimental 9-2.

Objance - At 1610H, a Kilo Company patrol found a small amount of enemy equipment at YD 192720. Genr was forwarded to Regimental S-2.

O'Jan68 - At 1300H, an India Company patrol discovered M-16 mines, firing devices and 81mm illumination rounds at YD 197726. The mines and 81mm rounds were destroyed in place.

OBJ an68 - No Significant Events.

Chross - At 0800H the wire sweep team found six (6) strands of double apron wire cut and a trip flare disarmed at YD 178718. The wire was repaired. At 1330H, a) the same coordinates, the engineers uncovered 5 ff mines. 3 mines were blown in place. 2 of the ff mines were deteriorated beyond effective use. A deteriorated MT mine was disarmed and forwarded to Regimental 3-2.

10Jan68 - At 0010H, a Kilo Comment patrol discovered fighting holes and bunkors at YD 195715 and YD 207717. Bunkers were destroyed. At 1420H the 9th Marines Regimental Commenter visited the battalian position.

11Janca - At 1445H six rounds of artillery fire wars received. The rounds impacted in the wire resulting in (1) WI' . n. vers. As a result of a crater analysis the artillery was determined to be from a friendly unit.

12Jan68 - At 0936H, Kilo Company, 3d Battalion, 4th Marines was chopped OPCON to the battalion. Kilo company, 3d Battalion, 3d Marines moved to the Hill #28 position. Previously occupied by 3d Battalion, 4th Marines. At 1400H Kilo Company received 6-8 sniper rounds from YD 168738. Returned fire with small arms and M-79's. There were no casualties received from the sniper fire. An artillary mission was called. One WA was observed to run north up a ridgeline. Subsequent grillery rounds impacted directly on the WA. 


