NARRATIVE SUMMARY

During the month of March, the Battalion was split because of numerous OPCON changes. The Battalion assisted in the pacification program in the HUONG HOA and CAM LO Districts for 23 days. Actual combat was limited to small unit contacts and the enemy mining of Route #9. Company K executed a daylight ambush and killed 21 NVA and captured 1 NVA WIA. On 24 March, the Battalion passed to OPCON of Task Force Hotel and moved to Vandegrift Combat Base. The CP and one company helilifted to FSB Cates. One company participated in Operation Purple Martin and 2 companies participated in Operation Maine Crag.

(2) During the month of March, the first 21 days Class V was drawn from the ASP at Quang Tri with no problems encountered. After the 21st, Class V was drawn from the LSA at Vandegrift Combat Base.

b. Resumply

During the first 21 days of March, resupply was by ground transportation. There were no problems concerning resupply during this period. From the 21st on, resupply was by helicopters. An inadequate number of helicopters for resupply was encountered during this period.

c. Evacuation & Hospitalization

- (1) Area of operation during this period was flat with little to no cover.
- (2) All medevacs were by helicopters and no problems were encountered.

d. Transportation

- (1) Toatal mileage on organic vehicles during March was 8,985.
- (2) Truck support was adequate.

e. Service

- (1) One platoon of Co B, 3d Engineer Battalion rendered assistance in all engineering tasks. Heavy equipment was unobtainable.
- (2) During the reporting period, the same platoon conducted road sweeps in the Battalion 'O.

During March, the Battalion was supported by 4 HST's from 3d Shore Party Battalion.

9. CIVIC ACTION

The Battalion S-5 assisted in the pacification program in the Cam Lo and Huong Hoa Districts. In Cam Lo, construction was begun on three schools by distributing materials, lumber, screening material, and blackboards. In Huong Hoa, the Bru hospital was stocked with medical supplies, blankets, air mattresses, cots, and a generator. Also two corpsmen were assigned on a permanent MedCap Program. All projects were turned over to leth, 9th Marines for completion.

10. ADMINISTRATION

- a. During the month of March, 3 SPCM were held and 7 Court Martials are pending. The Battalion Commander held 3 Office Hours. There were 12 Company Commander Office Hours held and 4 are pending.
- b. R&R continued to be a major morale fector. The Battalion received and used 87 Out Of Coutry R&R quotas. There were no In Country R&R quotas received.
- c. The morale was considered excellent.
- d. Postal service was good.
- e. No liberty was guthorized during the month.
- f. Marine Exchange facilities were not available to the Battalion as a whole. Limited Exchange was available for the Rear area personnel.
- g. During the month, the Battalion gave out the following awards:

12. INTELLIGENCE

a. Up until the 22nd of the month, the Battalion CP was at Cam Lo District Headquarters.

Co I set up a patrol base on ill 37. They ran 3 two day operations. The only significant incidents took place on 20 and 21 March, when they took approximately 45 820m mortar rounds in 5 different incidents.

Also, they found 15 bunkers and observed enemy regularly. There were several mining incidents on Route #9 near India's CP. On the 22nd, India was convoyed to Vandegrift Combat Base and then helilifted to FSB Saigon for 4 days. On the 28th, they were lifted to FSB Cates and joined the Alpha Command and Kilo Company.

Company Lima was at Khe Gio Bridge on Route #9. They had a few sniper incidents. On the 21st, Lima was helilifted to FSB Snapper. On the 28th, they were lifted to Vandegrift Combat Base and OPCON 3d Marines.

Corpany Mike was OPCON to the army and operated from Con Thien until the 21st when they were lifted to FSB Alpine and OPCON to 1stBn, 4th Marines.

Company Kilo was working out of Mai Loc and had 1 major contact on 9 March, when they sprung an ambush which resulted in 21 KIA and 1 POW and various gear captured. On the 22nd, Kilo was lifted to FSB Cates where the Alpha Command later joined them.

In general, the month of March contained only light and scattered action for the Battalion, mostly mining and sniper incidents.

- (1) Kit Carson Scouts got along well and most showed initiative and an eagerness to help their respective units.
- (2) All companies had Sniper Teams but were unable to put them to good use.
- (3) Two Interpreters were transferred because they were unsatisfactory. The other two were extremely helpful, especially since we were operating in a populated area for most of the month
- (4) The Battalion received two Dog Teams during the month but both were medevaced before they could be put to use.

13. COMMUNIC TIONS

a. During the first part of March, the Communications Platoon maintained it's wire and radio systems at Cam Lo and Quang Tri. Regiment arranged to have direct trunk lines wired to 2d Bn, 3d Marines switchboard in Quang Tri facilitating land line communications.

As the Battalion moved into it's new AO west of Vandegrift Combat Base, the Platoon established a minimum wire network at the Battalion Forward Rear at Vandegrift Combat Base.

b. Radio communication remained satisfactory with Vandegrift Combat Base and Quang Tri using the AS2236. Because of the high hills surrounding Vandegrift Combat Base two Antennas, AS2236, were required at that position.

- 01 Mar 69 No significant events.
- 02 Mar 69 1030H In the area of YD045567, a patrol of Co I received small arms fire from YD054575. An 81mm mortar mission was directed on the suspected enemy position and the firing ceased.

1030H In the area of XD990555, a jeep driver of 1st Bn, 3d Marines reported that a frag grenade was thrown at his vehicle and landed 35 m away.

03 Mar 69 1930H In the area of YD103539, elements of Co K discovered one indigenous person hiding in a culvert along the road. Interrogation resulted in that he was a CIDG personnel that was U1.

2000H In the area of YD104524, Popular Forces executed an ambush. The VC broke contact and 81mm HE and Illumination was called in. Another platoon of PF's were sent to reinforce the unit. A search of the area resulted in 2 VC KIA, 1 B40 rocket launcher, 2 B40 rounds, 1 AK47, and several Chicon grenades captured.

- 04 Mar 69 No significant events.
- 05 Mar 69 No significant events.
- 06 Mar 69 0210H In the crea of YD099531, a Popular Forces platoon executed an ambush resulting in 1 VC KI and 2 Chicon grenades captured.

1930H In the area of TD064529, a Popular Forces platoon made contact with approximately 15 VC carrying an M79 and B40 rockets. A mission of 81mm mortar HE and illumination and reaction force was employed, resulting in 1 VC KIA.

07 Mar 69 0745H Cam Lo District Headquarters received 3 sniper rounds from the village to the north. A sniper team was unable to observe the sniper.

1600H In the area of YD089592, a truck from MCB 58 while returning from the rock quarry hit a mine and observed 2 indigenous persons wearing black trousers and blue shirts with red armbands and running toward a village at YD065570. The area was checked by Co I with negative results.

1630H In the area of YD136515, a patrol of Co K discovered a hut that could house 2-3 personnel and 12 bunkers. The area was in poor condition, but looked to have been used recently. Also found was 1 RPG round and 2 AK47 magazines.

1730H In the area of YD123514, elements of Co K observed five personnel moving north, one was armed. They were taken under

fire and the enemy fled southwest. An artillery mission was called on the escape route and the area was searched with negative results.

- OB Mar 69 1830H In the area of YD125553; elements of Co K received sniper fire. An artillery mission was called on the suspected enemy position. Will check out the area at first light.
- 09 Mar 69 0800H In the area of YD125553, a patrol of Co K searched out the area from which they received sniper fire. Blood trails were found at YD125552.

O830H In the area of YD129516, a patrol of Co K executed a daylight ambush after observing 15 NVA. The ambush opened fire and then observed another 15 NVA. Artillery and 81mm mortar missions were called. A platoon of Co K and 2 tanks went to reinforce the ambush. They linked up and then exploited the contact. The enemy broke contact and fled southwest. A search of the area resulted in 21 NVA KIA, 13 AK47's, 37 NVA packs, 40 Chicom grenades, 5 E-tools, cooking utensils, and 3 machettes.

- 10 Mar 69 No significant events.
- 11 Mar 69 1520H In the area of YD137520, a patrol of Co K detonated a booby trapped 82mm mortar round. Searched the area for more booby traps with negative results.

1525H In the area of YD136519, a patrol of Co K observed one NVA and opened fire resulting in 1 NVA KIA, 1 AK47 with 3 magazines, and 2 Chicom grenades.

12 Mar 69 0715H In the area of YDO4'568, elements of Co L while on a road sweep made point contact with an unknown sized NV A/VC force. The patrol received 2 RPG rounds and a command detonated mine. Fire was returned and an 81mm mortar mission called with unknown results.

0840H In the area of YD133532, a patrol of Co K found 3 booby traps. Destroyed them in place.

1100H In the area of YD052565, the road sweep missed a mine and the security vehicle detonated the mine. The shrapnel struck 4 civilians walking along the road, killing 1.

1120H In the area of YD135514, a patrol of Co K discovered 2 bunkers. The first bunker had cooking utensils, the second had 3 RPG rounds. Several trails were found, two were used in the last 3-4 days. The bunkers were destroyed.

1430H In the area of YD05255, a tank hit a mine in the same

area where the road sweep security vehicle struck a mine. The road had been swept and the road was open to traffic at about the time the tank struck the mine.

1445H In the area of YD133578, a patrol of Co K found 1 RPG2 and 2 RPG7 rounds. Further search of the area resulted in 1 bloody NA helmet.

13 Mar 69 0200H In the area of YD037561, elements of Co L observed 3-5 VC on the road. They appeared to be laying wire from the road. Swept the area with negative results.

1030H In the area of YD138534, a patrol of Co K found a daisy chain consisting of 20m of detonation cord and 4 blast-ting caps set along side of a fresh trail.

1330H In the area of YD063594, a patrol of Co I discovered 9 bunkers 3-5 months old containing 21 82mm mortar rounds, 3 cans of increments, and boosters. The bunker had not been used recently. The bunkers were destroyed.

14 Mar 69 0815H In the area of YD093518, elements of Co K observed 2
Popular Forces personnel step on a mine. The area was checked with negative results.

1025H In the area of YD074594, a tank moved into a day position and struck a mine. The area had not been swept.

- MA hiding behind a rock. They were taken under small arms, artillery, and tank fire. The enemy was flushed out from behind the rocks with grenades. A search of the area uncovered 3 NA killed by small arms, 1 by artillery, 4 bunkers about 3 weeks old, 1 messhall, 2 AK47's, 2 SKS's, 1 RPG7 launcher and 3 rounds, 10 Chicom grenades, 11 NA packs, and documents.
- 16 Mar 69 0915H In the area of YD057610, elements of Co I on patrol with tanks received 2 RPG rounds. The rounds were short. Fire was returned and the area checked out with negative results.

1015H In the area of YD052627, elements of Co I received 10-12 rounds of 82mm mortar fire. The fire was returned by tanks and artillery. The tanks made a direct hit on one of the nortars.

1050H In the area of YD079571, a truck from 1st Bn, 9th Marines hit a mine. The road was reswept with negative results.

1430H In the area of YDO %537, a truck driver from 3d MT Bn reported that while crossing a bridge traveling south he received 3 rounds of sniper fire, all missing the truck.

- 17 Mar 69 1650H In the area of YDO62570, a truck driver reported that he received probable 60mm morter rounds from the northwest.

 One hit his truck and one hit an Army truck.
- 18 Mar 69 0839H In the area of YD108577, the road sweep team found 1

 AT mine and 2 fake mines made out of C-ration cans and sand
 bags. All were blown in place.
- 19 Mar 69 1300H In the area of YD054577, elements of Co I observed 82mm mortar rounds impacting on the road. Movement was observed and artillery, tanks, and fixed wing were called in with unknown results.
- 20 Mar 69 1325H In the area of YDO94613, a patrol of Co I discovered 3 RPG rounds with boosters and unservicable 782 gear. All were destroyed.

1715H In the area of YDO55614, elements of Co I observed 10 NVA moving east. Called in artillery with unknown results.

21 Mar 69 0630H In the area of YDO93063, elements of Co I received 8-10 rounds of 82mm mortar. Fired artillery on the suspected position with unknown results.

0900H In the area of YD086615, a tank with Co I struck a mine and had to be retrieved.

1024H In the area of YD093618, a personnel carrier (USA) struck an AT mine and was destroyed.

1140H In the area of YD066602, Co I received 5 rounds of 82mm mortar fire. Called in fixed wing and artillery with unknown results.

1530H In the area of YD061614, elements of Co I observed 7-10 NV NVC. They were taken under fire with tanks and mortars, resulting in 3 NVA KIA.

1530H In the area of YD072615, a patrol of Co I discovered 25 bunkers overheaded with dirt and logs. They were about 3-4 weeks old and contained 1 RPG round, 22 60mm rounds, 1 poncho, 1 plastic sheet, 3 E-tools, 1 pick, 1 saw, 1 water can, 3 rice bowls, and 3 contains pots. All gear was turned in to S-2 and the bunkers destroyed.

1530H In the area of YTO62626, an 10 reported a bunker complex to be searched out at a later date.

1540H In the area of YD066613, elements of Co I observed 7-10 NV A. Called in fixed wine, artillery, and mortars. Searched area and found 3 No. 124, 1 SKS, 1 AK47, 1 light

MG, 1 Chicon grenede, 110 AK47 rounds, 30 60mm mortar fuses, 1 RPG round, 3 helmets, pots and pans, and various documents that were turned in to the S-2.

1. SITUATION

Enemy Forces A significant buildup of NVA vehicle traffic, artillery and rocket positions, and storage complexes has been detected along Route 926 mear the Laotian border. Indications are that this road is being used to move men and material from Laos staging areas for support of attacks on Vandergrift Combat Base, Route 9, and friendly elements operating in the southwestern portion of I Corps. NVA infantry units can be expected to be providing security for this ICC. No specific units have been identified. Periodic INTSUMS will supplement current intelligence. See Annex 3 of reference (b).

b. Friendly Forces

- (1) 3d Marines (-), as an element of Task Force Hotel, conducts a heliborne assualt and a search and destroy operation to interdict Route 926.
- (2) Artillery 1/12 (-) provides D/S fires for 3d Marines from FS3's.
- (3) Air Helicopter assualt, gunships and medevac support, and fixed wing CAS and AO's will be provided by 1st HAM aircraft.
- c. Attachments and Detachments See Annex A (Task Organization.)

2. MISSION

At H-Hour on D-Day 3/3 (Rein) conducts a heliborne assualt to establish a FSB and to conduct search and destroy operations to interdict Route 926 and to locate and destroy enemy forces, fortifications, and supply caches in the objective area.

3. EXECUTION

a. Concept of Operation To be passed separately by frag order. See Annex B (Operation Overlay).

b. Coordinating Instructions

- (1) D-Day and H-Hour to be announced.
- (2) Units will have at least external L7's.
- (3) Current thrust points and brevity codes must be used. See Annex B (Operation Overlay).
- (4) Expedite spot reports.
- (5) Objectives and additional missions may be assigned by frag order.
- (6) Fires are cleared into Laos.
- (7) Code name: Operation "Maine Crag".

4. ADMINISTRATION & LOGISTICS

- 2. Supply Units carry normal combat equipment.
 - (1) Assault loads Class I: 6 LRP's, 2 DOS MCI, halazone tablets
 Class V: B/A plus 2 DOA
 - (2) Resupply to be staged at VCB.
 - (3) Current plans call for no routine resupply during first days of operation.
- Evecuation Medevac helicopters using normal procedures will conduct evacuations.

5. COMMAND & COMMUNICATIONS

- a. Current 30P's, COI, shackle sheets, and brevity codes will be used.
- b. Cipher capability will be maintained by the CP.
- c. Companies will not take RC 292 antennas.
- d. Radio operators will maintain 2 spare batteries.
- e. Report positions of moving elements each & hour and make situation reports each & hour during hours of darkness.
- f. CP's
 - (1) 3d Marines to be ennounced.
