

HARDATIVE SUITIARY

1. GENERAL OVERAL, VIAN OF Lik ACTIVITIES. The Battalion operated in 2 S/D operations and 1 special operation. 1-2 May Operation Maine Grag, 3-31 May Operation Virginia Ridge, and 26-27 May Operation Pink Panther (Operation the DMZ. See After Action report in supporting documents). Enemy contact during the earlier part of May was characterized by booby traps and 3-4 man point contacts. As the Battalion moved to the north and northwest, they began to discover mumorous bunkers and storage/resupply caches of the enemy. Numerous enemy northwest incidents began to take place. The Battalion changed over from Battalion administration to company level administration.

- 4. INTELLIGENCE. During the month of May, the Battalion operated in 2 similar areas with unrelated missions. Up to 2 May, Operation Maine Crag was conducted in the Viotnetese solient south of Khe Sahn. On 3 May, the Battalion commenced Operation Vi ginia Ridge in the Mutter's Ridge area northwest of Dong Ha mountain. Thile in the Virginia Ridge AO, enemy activity was light to modium. Several large caches were found. Company L discovered a large bunker complex and cache on 16 May in the vicinity of YDO58612. Total contacts in the Virginia Ridge AO were 19 minor contacts, 6 incidents involving mines and booby traps, 14 nortar attacks, and several miscellaneous incidents. Based upon an accumulation of high level intelligence source items; numerous sightings by aerial observers, sightings, sketches, and other evidence collected by 3d Recom Bn, SLAR, IR, and aerial photography. It was desmed that a major operation should be conducted to seek out and destroy enony supply/storage areas within

the AO. The Virginia Ridge AO is a densely forrested nountainous area. Elevation ranges from 100 to 549 neters. The AO runs SW-NS to the southern border of the DMZ. The NVA apparently are not restricted in their novements and thus chose to construct large bunker complexes and supply and storage areas.

a. Frequency modul ted equipment continued to remain offective and highly reliable. The antenna system \$2236 was carried as supplemental

company by the command group in the field. However, only extreme ranges in connection with critical terrain features would justify the extra weight and burden of the antenna during command post displacement. The properly oriented antenna AS2236 in the rear areas along with modified ground plane antennas in the field provided reliable FM communication.

09 May 1130H In the area of YD002623, elements of Co M discovered an enemy water point that appeared to be an overnight position. There were hellow banboo shoots running into the water. Sendal tracks approximately 24hrs old were found around the water point. Artillery was called in on the position that night with unknown results.
